President - Elect Rosalie Davis-Green

It is a pleasure to be in Marathon Florida for the annual meeting.

It is a challenge to maintain membership and to grow the organization. Members are our most important asset. Are we showing we care for and appreciate the members? I recently reviewed some IOBG reference material. The concepts identified address membership issues and are as applicable in 2015 as they were when they were first stated 10 years ago: Retention, Recruitment, Recognition and Support.

Retention - It is very important to ensure our activities continue to meet the needs of the current membership. Are we seeking their input prior to planning the calendar? Are we surveying them to find out what they would like to do in the upcoming year? What charities would they like to support? What type of activity can members help with? Members will be committed to participate more if they had an opportunity to participate in the planning process. How well are we engaging our new members?

Recruitment - New members are recommended by their club's chapter of IOBG. Do we have a special event introducing sitting commodores to IOBG? Do we invite a commodore we think is a good potential member of IOBG to our IOBG events and share with them our enjoyment. Do we have a system of mentoring new members? Is someone assigned to contact a new member, ask if they have any questions about membership and personally invite the new member to join them at the next event? A new member who has been personally invited by another member feels more welcomed than just the official welcome at their induction. Satisfied members are our best recruiting tool.

Recognition - We are all volunteers. Members work hard to accomplish tasks on behalf of the organization. Be generous in recognizing their efforts and accomplishments. Use the District newsletter to recognize members. Welcome new members through the newsletter. Include in the newsletter items such as: get well wishes, condolences, name those who helped with the last club activity, list who is working on the next activity and show pictures of the members in action. Some tasks that keep an organization going are self-gratifying. Other tasks are necessary but not particularly exciting. It helps to know that people appreciated your efforts. Do we have special recognitions at change of watch for individuals, chapters and districts that have done outstanding work in the last 12 months? Morale is not good when people feel they are taken for granted.

Support - Provide encouragement, problem solving and assistance to those who are attempting to produce an event or provide a service to the local yachting community. They need to know we are all in this together.

These are basic concepts we all learned on the road to becoming a commodore. As past commodores, we are all still human. We will respond positively when we feel we are treated well. If the members don't feel they are treated well, they will find other ways to serve the community. We want members to choose IOBG as one their ways of enjoying and serving the yachting community.

It is always nice to report positive information. Mary Nye Meyers, our Communications Director, reports that LOG newsletter information is coming in much faster and has made editing of the LOG much easier. Remember, articles are due two (2) weeks following the meeting.

The word is getting out. Districts and chapters are taking advantage of the media when possible. Doing good things for the community makes us feel good and we as an organization stand a little taller in the eyes of the community whether we are taking seniors out for a sunny afternoon boat ride, helping the disabled forget their disability for a few hours or providing life jackets so young and old alike can enjoy the sun and water, safely. A little name recognition from the media helps the cause at hand.

I would to give a shout out to district 5 for a job well done and their use of the media. The Humanitarian Foundation funded Next Door which partners with Safe Kids Columbia Gorge, to purchase 320 life jackets for the kiosks. The goals for this program are to increase life jacket usage during water-based activities by having a variety of PFDs readily available at major water play areas where boating and swimming are undertaken.

I have had the opportunity to ask the question of several districts, "Are you announcing to the public that your local district or chapter of the IOBG is responsible for the event, have you let the media know who planned, financed and carried out the project? When you ask the media to cover your project, ask how many times they will announce to the public your event in advance helping to make your project an even bigger success. The response to my question was a resounding no and to the last person, it was agreed, we as an organization, need to make our presents better known in our communities.

The word is out, tell the public what you are doing. Announce it to the world. Your chapters and districts will grow because of that recognition. It is nice when you to walk into a prospective yacht club knowing they respect that you are Blue Gavel. Now, add the respect of the community because of your doing for others. It becomes a slam-dunk. 

Treasurer Marshall Nemoy

I attended our Annual Meeting in Marathon, Florida in October. I presented the Treasurer's report which contained the financial results for the nine months ended September 30, 2015. The statements showed IOBG to be financially healthy and noted area of good performance. The membership statistics showed we had lost 88 members for the year. However the losses came from areas that had been stable for a number of years. Some believed the loss was due to the increase in dues. However the report showed that the districts that had voted against the dues increase had, in fact, increased their total members. The Executive Committee is investigating the reasons for the loss of members.

A budget for 2016 was presented and discussed. The Board of Directors voted to adopt the 2016 budget. The 2016 Budget did not call for a dues increase.

Any member in good standing may contact the treasurer's office to request a copy of the treasurer's report or the 2016 budget.

We are receiving 2016 dues payments almost daily. Dues received after September 30, 2015 are considered for 2016 unless specified otherwise. The design for the 2016 membership card was selected by the board members attending the Friday session in Marathon, Florida. We are processing dues payments in one or two days. The most important information required in addition to your name and address is your email address. The Blue Gavel Log and The Lighthouse are now sent by email. A printed copy of The Blue Gavel Log is available for a \$10 annual fee payable with your dues.

Another item is the name of your chapter. Please do not use initials. Spell out the name. I belong to Mission Bay Yacht Club(MBYC) in District 15. There also is a Moro Bay Yacht Club (MBYC) in District 16 and a Mactawa Bay Yacht Club (MBYC) in District 23. Enough said.

The Lighthouse our email only publication has been gaining acceptance from our membership. Our goal is to provide a monthly concise newsletter to our members. The metrics on the number of emails sent and opened are better than the industry standard for such a publication. To make it even more useful to our members we need news items from our districts.

As we begin another year let us all work together to build an organization we can all be proud of.

Despite the \$10.00 dues increase for 2015, the members that were lost, by and large, were not a result of the dues increase. We received new members, installed new chapters and the total fewer members was minimal for the year ending August 1. The dues increase enabled the Area Vice Presidents to attend Regional Meetings by helping pay their travel. By having most of the AVPs at the Regional meetings, the communication level increased from them to their districts and chapters.

We noticed that more members were opening the "Lighthouse" email bulletin and LOG newsletter. Hopefully, they read these as they are the best forms of communication to the general membership of what is going on around the organization.

Last year Past President Gary McGrath created monthly conference calls for the Executive Committee. These were continued nearly every month in 2015. Also, significant changes to the Bylaws and Policy Manual were made to ease the confusion of accepting dues in a year when a dues increase was approved by the Executive Committee. The Humanitarian Foundation has been reorganized and it was determined that only two Area Vice Presidents may serve on its Board in any one year, a major step in the Foundation's ability to govern effectively.

As members of the Blue Gavel, we should be proud of our being a selective group of international yachting and boating organizations. As such, we enjoy the value of a strong auxiliary and newly reorganized Humanitarian Foundation. Through these organizations, we enjoy friendships and relationships all of which contribute to our success as an organization.

This has been a most interesting year for Nancy and me. We have made new friends and acquaintances, reunited with old ones and thoroughly enjoyed our experiences in the Gavel. I was told by several Past Presidents that my year as President would be over very quickly - it certainly was. Even though I have been attending Annual Meetings since 2004, I learned a great deal more about this great organization in the last five years, having served as North Central Area Vice President, and as a member of the Executive Committee. Host Katy Nastro was all in at the 44th Annual Figawi Race weekend. Figawi kicked off the Cape Cod and Nantucket summer season. Entries included over 3000 sailors from all over the country and over 240 boats.

Katy checked-in with Sailing Worlds Helly Hansen NOOD regatta on Lake Michigan, hosted by Chicago Yacht Club.

In Southern California Katy gets the low down on the Long Beach Race week's Yacht Club Challenge.

Katy took us off the traditional sailing course from Martha's Vineyard in this episode to taking lessons Kiteboarding with Rob Douglas, one of the fastest sailors in the world.

Katy took us to Annapolis, Maryland as we highlighted the Chesapeake Region Accessible Boating (CRAB) Crab's mission is to make the therapeutic benefits of sailing and the freedom it provides a reality for physically and /or developmentally-challenged individuals and their families regardless of their financial circumstances.

Katy took us to San Francisco for the unique and exciting Ronstan Bridge to Bridge Race and 18-foot Skiff International Regatta, hosted by St. Francis Yacht Club.

A weather alert forecasting over 20 knots of winds and 5 to 7 foot seas wasn't good news for Kathy Allyn, Chairwoman of the USA Junior Olympic Festival at Mentor Harbor Yachting Club (MHYC) on Lake Erie in June. When 126 participants, age 7 to 18 arriving for the events with their parents, she had to think fast.

110 boats, 168 sailors and a boat load of solid racing in Camden Harbor at the 2015 Junior Olympics hosted by the Camden Area Youth Seamanship Program and Camden Yacht Club was spectacular.

With the help of Beneteau America, US Sailing has implemented its STEM Educational Reach Program in South Carolina to help get kids learning and sailing.

US Sailing is currently accepting nominations for 2015 Yachtsman and Yachtswoman of the Year awards.




District 14 is looking forward working towards a grant from the IOBG Foundation and our new Director, Susan West and her new leadership 2016.



The mission of the Foundation states that it provides the boating community the ability to create real differences in others' lives. It provides resources to existing charities and benefits the communities through new initiatives involving boating activities. So, what does that really mean to you? It means that there is, within the Blue Gavel organization, a 501(c)(3) Charitable and Educational entity that can help you in your community service efforts.

A community project that your district, chapter or yacht club is interested in helping can apply to the Foundation for funds to implement their program. The individual contributions by members that are not tax deductible when the club collects them will be deductible when they are donated directly to the Foundation. We hope this sounds interesting to you and that you will want additional information.

A specific community service program is not a prerequisite--your contributions to the Foundation are already helping others. This year the Foundation has provided funding for a summer sailing program benefiting students from the community's elementary and middle schools at Huntington Harbor Yacht Club in District 10. In District 5, we funded Next Door which partners with Safe Kids Columbia Gorge, to purchase 320 life jackets for the kiosks. The goals for this program are to increase life jacket wear during water-based activities by having a variety of PFDs readily available at major water play areas where boating and swimming are undertaken. The most recent grant was approved for District 16 for The Channel Islands Maritime Museum for the Youth Navigation Exhibit that benefits their Youth Education Programs, to focus on history and marine science. The Youth Learning Center will be learning chart reading and celestial navigation on land and on a boat. At the present time we still are awaiting more information on the project from District 7 for the Lake County Yacht Club for the event "Len Anderson Dean Palmer Day" and District 11, for the Life Sail Program. Your contributions make these things possible.
